Sydney Archdioceses Central Council President - John Walden's Message

The Sydney Archdiocese has had to deal with two main issues over the last month or so. These are gaining full accreditation for members and filling all Regional Council positions. In addition, there has been some progress with the re-entry into providing EAPA assistance.

Member accreditation

It is a (NSW) legislative requirement for members who perform home visitations, attend Conference meetings where cases are discussed, have dealings with Society funds or interact with other members and discuss client matters, must be fully compliant across all three areas. These areas of compliance are Working with Children Checks, Police Checks and Child Safe training.

The Central Council decided at its meeting in late February 2023 that full compliance would be required by 1 April and non-compliant members after that point in time would be placed into the category of being Inactive. Between the date of the resolution and 1 April non-compliance dropped by almost 60%. This number of non-compliant is dropping again since members have been placed into the Inactive status.

It is an easy exercise to reinstate members to being active if they complete all their compliances checks. This compliance is not a Vinnies' requirement, but is mandated by (NSW) Legislation following the Royal Commission into Child Abuse.

New Regional Presidents

Since the last newsletter there have been two Regional Presidents elected. These are Peter Marshall in Northern Suburbs and Tom Story in Sydney. We wish them well in their endeavours and representing their members in their Regional Councils.

EAPAs

We are hopeful of re-entering the offering of EAPAs to people in need of assistance with energy costs. This could be around mid-year. Soon members will be given an insight into the new streamlined process and can decide whether they wish to participate in offering the service.

More details about the process to deliver EAPA assistance will be sent to Conferences and members in the coming weeks. They will be asked to indicate whether they would like to participate in offering EAPA assistance. Participation is not mandatory and joining later may be an option.



Winter Appeal Ready!

As the temperature begins to drop and we start to feel a chill in the air, for many who are homeless or struggling with higher energy bills, this winter will be particularly bleak. This year's Vinnies Winter Appeal focuses on a fast-growing cohort of people experiencing homelessness in Australia: women over 55.

We know homelessness can affect anyone, but women over 55 are particularly vulnerable. The 2021 census showed the number of older women experiencing homelessness continued to grow after ballooning by more than 30% between 2011 and 2016. In 2023, this is a more concerning issue due to additional stress brought on by the cost of living and housing affordability crises causing more older women to find themselves homeless or at risk of homelessness.

The Society thanks our dedicated Members for the important role they play in raising funds for the Winter Appeal so we can continue give a hand up to those in our community who need it the most. The Winter Appeal will launch on 1 May 2023. Materials to support your Winter Appeal efforts, such as posters, donation envelopes and conference booklets should be available from Monday 17 April.


These include families under severe financial, accommodation and psychological stress; single mums with young babies and homeless people.

RANA'S STORY

Rana is a 36-year-old man who has spent more than half his life studying and working in Australia. Sadly in 2018 he was detained by Immigration for a visa breach and is on a temporary protection visa without work or study rights and without access to Medicare, living in 'limbo land'. **This is Rana's story:**





ed. For the last two years of High School, Rana attended a Catholic senior High School (Notre Dame, Dhaka) as a non-Catholic student, after convincing his parents that it had superior facilities, courses and results. During his two years there, Rana was impressed by the example of the teachers and became interested in Christianity.

Rana completed his school studies in 2004, then undertook an intensive English course. He applied for and was offered entry as an international student to a Diploma in Information Technology at Sydney's Global College. Shortly after his arrival, he commenced part-time work with an Electrical Maintenance firm. Rana's interest in Christianity continued to grow in Australia and he started Bible study in 2006 developing a network of Christian friends and started attending services.

Unfortunately for Rana, Global College lost its registration in 2011 and Rana was forced to suspend his studies and seek feerecovery through the Government. The lengthy process in refunding fees delayed Rana's studies but by the time he was able to enrol into an Electrical and Telecommunication Diploma to Degree course through Bankstown TAFE/University of Western Sydney, his parents withdrew financial support following his conversion to Christianity. He was ostracised by his family and intimidated by Islamic community members. Rana did not have enough money to pay the full cost of tuition, leading to him suspending his studies.

Rana continued to work as an Electrical assistant until 2017 and acquired a range of other skills in the building industry. In March 2018, Rana was detained by Department of Home Affairs at Villawood due to a visa breach. He applied for protection, given the risk to him of returning to Bangladesh following his conversion to Christianity. He was granted a temporary bridging visa following support by community members and sponsorship but is not permitted to work; study or access Medicare. He has used his time doing

Vinnies Kingsgrove Conference and Our Lady of Fatima Kingsgrove have undertaken a petition on Rana's behalf to the Minister for Immigration, the Honourable Andrew Giles for a visa and work and study rights. This petition has been supported by other parishes in the region including St Declan's Penshurst; Our Lady of Fatima Peakhurst; Our Lady of Lourdes Earlwood and St Bernadette's Clemton Park. Rana has over 1000 supporters including these parishioners and online supporters. The Government skills and jobs summit has identified the shortages in the area that Rana has skills. It makes no sense to prevent him studying and working -allowing him would alleviate the skill shortage and save the Government (and taxpayers) the cost of the Status Resolution Support Payment he receives.

volunteer work for Vinnies and other agencies. His application for protection was rejected by the Department of Home Affairs but

Rana has appealed to the Administrative Appeals Tribunal. It is now five years since his original application for protection.

We are hopeful that the Government's decision to allow 19,000 refugees to stay permanently in Australia will be extended to Rana.

Following this, our Gymea Conference enrolled Wilma in the Rite of the Christian Initiation of Adults programme. Our Members took on the responsibility in getting Wilma to the RCIA lessons every Sunday morning and to attend Mass.

The ceremony on Saturday night was such a wonderful, joyous occasion for Wilma and family, supported by her St Vincent de Paul friends and many parishioners.

It was truly a holy and blessed night.

CRISP Program-Community Refugee Integration Support Pilot

Over the past months discussion has taken place with the Sutherland Regional Council members regarding the possibility of engaging with the CRISP program. This is a Federal Government program that enables groups of everyday Australians to welcome refugees into their local area from 'day one' of their Australian journey. Our group will assist one of these families, referred by UNHCR and identified as in urgent need of resettlement.

The support is for a minimum of 12 months, and the CRISP program requires us to having funding available to support the family until their Centrelink and Medicare benefits are established, and until the family is able to source an income. It provides them with practical resettlement and integration support, in line with other community sponsorship programs operating successfully around the world. The CRISP program is run by Community Refugee Sponsorship Australia and UNHCR.

The Vinnies CRISP Conference has now formed with eight core members who are in the process of completing six hours mandatory training. The Vinnies CRISP Conference is grateful for the support of the Regional Council.

Later in the year De La Salle Caringbah is going to hold a benefit night, organised through their music department. We hope to make this a community event. More information to follow.

Please share this good News story with your Conferences, and keep this refugee family and the CRISP members in your prayers, as we journey together, in hope and justice, by introducing them to a better life here in Australia.

Not to be outdone, Allen's wife, Teresa was able to put her adept skills to good use as well. Spotlight had large premade Block Out curtains on special which Teresa had




GYMEA CONFERENCE- A VERY HAPPY CHRISTMAS

'Leading for Impact', the Society's New Leadership Program is open for Registrations

We are pleased to announce the rollout of a new leadership program, co-created with the University of Notre Dame.

This program is specifically designed for aspiring and current Regional and Central Council Presidents, as well as any interested member of the Society thinking about future leadership positions. It provides a unique opportunity to develop the knowledge and skills necessary to lead with purpose and impact from a Vincentian perspective. The course draws on the University's vast experience in leadership development for Catholic organisations.

Participants will gain formation and a deeper understanding of leadership theory, while also learning practical strategies and best practices for leading and managing service-orientated organisations.

The program will be delivered in person at the University of Notre Dame in Sydney and is broken down into seven face-to-face modules of 6-7 hours each that explore:

Formation, which focuses on Catholic Social Teaching and encourages participants to make connections between the experiences of poverty, disadvantage and marginalisation that they encounter in their everyday work and the unjust structures that contribute to inequality and exclusion.

Leadership and management, which explores contemporary business leadership and management practice in the context of Catholic leadership.

Governance, which explores principles of governance and regulation particularly as it applies to not-for-profit organisations. **Financial reporting**, which helps participants develop applicable finance, accounting and business skills.

Counselling skills for leaders, which provides participants with skills to enhance relationships and improve our capacity to serve the poor and marginalised with compassion, respect and empathy.

Supporting member and volunteer engagement, which addresses factors that help sustain volunteer engagement.

Digital communication and security, which provides the knowledge and skills to effectively communicate and collaborate in a digital environment while also keeping sensitive information secure.

We are currently looking for the first cohort of participants. These will be delivered at Notre Dame, Broadway on Friday 28th and Saturday 29th April for the initial sessions, with a follow-up session to be held on the 16th June. Participants can be current leaders, those who aspire to be in a leadership position, or those who demonstrate leadership skills but may not yet recognise themselves as a leader. Young Vincentians are encouraged to apply.

Club 'Norths' Grant makes huge difference to homeless people




Norths gave Vinnies a grant of \$15,000 to help its work in dealing with people who are homeless, evicted or escapees from domestic violence situations. When people are desperate, so often they turn to Vinnies. Some need accommodation in a budget motel or guesthouse for a few days, while a longer term solution can be developed. The pleasure and gratitude of someone able to sleep securely in a clean bed, without fear of assault or robbery, commonly

experienced by those sleeping 'rough', is overwhelming. Some challenges are more complex and take more

time – and money. Vinnies was caring for a family escaping domestic violence. The family of four was squeezed into a one-bedroom flat in poor condition, surviving through the help of Vinnies and the kindness of family friends. Vinnies was able to locate more suitable accommodation on a secure basis, enabling the mother to resume work and become independent again. This could not have been achieved without the Norths' grant.'

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

New Census homelessness figures: A national crisis

Action on homelessness and housing must be made an immediate priority for all levels of government following the alarming figures on homelessness released as part of the Australian Bureau of Statistic's latest census.

"It is not an overstatement to say that this is a national crisis and drastic action has to happen right now to ensure everyone has a safe and secure place to live," said Yolanda Saiz, St Vincent de Paul Society NSW then Acting CEO.

"Homelessness across Australia has risen by 5.2% from 116,427 to 122,494 people during the course of the last census. It was pleasing to see the number of people experiencing homelessness in NSW decreased from 37,692 to 35,011 since 2016, down 7%.



"However, the number of people experiencing homelessness is still 27% higher than the 2011 census.

"It is unacceptable that the number of people experiencing homelessness remains so high, especially given the efforts made during the height of the pandemic, when the census was taken, to ensure our most vulnerable were housed. The Government set precedent, providing people sleeping rough with emergency accommodation during the worst of the COVID lockdowns.

"We know it is possible, when there is political will, to provide greater assistance to people experiencing homelessness. We've seen at a state level that targeted programs such as Together Home for rough sleepers and the Social and Affordable Housing Fund (SAHF) have helped contribute to a 7% decrease in the number of people experiencing homelessness in NSW. We need to keep working on reducing homelessness in NSW and around Australia," Ms Saiz said.

The ABS statistics reveal that there has been a 63% decrease in rough sleepers throughout NSW from 2,588 in 2016 to 963 in 2021, while the homeless rate was 43 persons for every 10,000 persons in the 2021 Census, down from 50.4 in 2016 Census.

"Our members are seeing the reality of the housing and homelessness crisis every day in the communities where they live and work," said Paul Burton, St Vincent de Paul Society NSW State President. "Around a quarter of the people we've assisted this year have sought help for the first time, including a growing rate of families and people working full-time, because there is simply not enough money to make ends meet.

"We cannot allow things to continue as they have been with housing; we need to see major reforms and investment to give the most vulnerable in our communities safety now and hope for the future. The Society commissioned research from UNSW last year which showed that if the NSW Government built 5,000 new social housing dwellings every year for a decade, the NSW social housing waiting list would be reduced by three quarters.

"We've also called for an increase in funding for Specialist Homelessness Services which will be vitally important as a necessary measure to ensure services are properly funded to meet the growing demand for assistance.

"We cannot wait any longer to address the homelessness and housing crisis – action is needed now," Mr Burton said.

CLEAR PATHWAY TO VOICE REFERENDUM

Following months of consultations with the Referendum Working decisions that affect their lives permanently. Group, the Government has announced the wording of the referendum question and draft constitutional amendment for the proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament. The guestion the Parliament will now consider to be put to the Australian people will be:

A Proposed Law: to alter the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice.

The Government hopes to have Parliamentary approval by the end of June, with the referendum to be held between October and December.

Earlier this year, representatives of the Society of St Vincent de Paul participated in the 'Yes 23' campaign launch in Adelaide. The launch saw over 100 grassroots organisations

come together to support the campaign for a First Nations Voice to Parliament.

The breadth and diversity of these organisations reflect a strong backing of the Call of the *Uluru Statement From the Heart* as well as the commitment to build community understanding, awareness and support for the referendum.

The Society of St Vincent de Paul in NSW and across the nation

supports the call for a First Nation's Voice enshrined in the Constitution. This derives and is informed by our Good Works of charity and justice.

We support the Voice because we aspire to a society transformed by compassion and built on justice - where the dignity and hope of all people is respected by ensuring they have control of their own destiny. We know the importance of vulnerable people having a voice. As The Rule states,

> The Society helps the poor and disadvantaged speak for themselves. When they cannot, the Society must speak on behalf of those who are ignored. (I #7.5)

A Voice to Parliament is about ensuring the First Nations people have a real say in the

The Society's support for the Voice is a matter of social justice – not politics.

One in five people seeking our support in NSW identify as being Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander. In their hardship we witness

> the long-term impact of the dispossession and powerlessness endured since the earliest days of colonisation.

Giving First Nations peoples a voice will help break this vicious cycle and lead to better laws and policies for the wellbeing of their families and communities.

The Society's Social Justice Team have developed a suite of resources to support our networks to better understand and take action in support of the *Uluru Statement from* the Heart, and the Voice to parliament.

Spiritual Reflection - A Voice Calls Out

ISAIAH 40: 3-5

- 3 The voice of one calling out, "Clear the way for the Lord in the wilderness; Make straight in the desert a path for our God.
- 4 Let every valley be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; And let the uneven ground become a plain, And the rugged terrain a broad valley;
- 5 Then the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all flesh will see it together; For the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

When we think of the wilderness sometimes, we are reminded of rough terrain or barren deserts. We see the wilderness again in New Testament before Jesus is crucified, he is led by the Spirit into the wilderness. This time was one of immeasurable pain for Jesus.

So, when we hear about the wilderness in this passage from Isaiah, we also hear that a voice of one cries out right here. What is the pain in this wilderness? From this place of pain, where there is isolation and harsh conditions, a voice of one cries out!

We can view this as a single voice, like the voice we recall from Exodus with Moses and the burning bush, or the still small voice of God in a rushing wind. Or, we can see this as one united voice! A voice of unity from the places of pain and despair, within this wilderness comes a collective cry to make the paths straight.

We are asked in the *Uluru Statement from the Heart* to walk with our First Nations peoples in unity with them for truth seeking, treaty and A VOICE.

From our very own wilderness within our Nation's brutal history we are called to raise the valleys and smooth out the uneven

ground and take our part in a more just and compassionate society.

This passage of scripture finishes with what we can reflect on as a commissioning from God for this most important demand.


Preparing these paths, walking in unity and being a voice of one will then reveal the glory of the Lord, that the Lord has spoken.

We must always look for opportunities where we can speak into the darkness of the wilderness of our days and do whatever good works are at our hands for sake of dignity, truth and restoration.

Sydney Alliance Unites for the Common Good

St Vincent de Paul Society NSW members and leadership were among over 45 diverse community organisations, unions and religious organisations united in an Assembly calling for social justice in the lead up to the 2023 State Election. The over 900-strong Assembly was held in Westmead on Tuesday 28 February.

Matt Kean (NSW Treasurer), Daniel Mookhey (Shadow Treasurer) and Jenny Leong (NSW Greens spokesperson on Housing) headlined the political attendees, while speakers with lived experience shared moving personal testimonies highlighting why our politicians need to act.

With the current cost of living and housing crisis leaving a growing number of people in precarity, including many needing to seek assistance from organisations such as the Society for the first time, the Assembly called on the State's political leaders to commit to eight asks on social and affordable housing, climate and cost of living, and belonging and democracy.

On the night, both major parties said they understood the need to boost the supply of social and affordable housing so that key workers, people on low incomes, and the growing number of people experiencing homelessness have a place to call home. Regrettably though, neither committed any figures on funding or social housing places that would back this shared concern.

Both parties agreed any new social and affordable homes delivered through development partnerships will remain so in perpetuity.

They also agreed to meet with the Sydney Alliance within the first 100 days after forming government to discuss issues facing temporary migrants. Both parties also agreed to consultation on minimum energy efficiency standards in rentals.

While Labor stated its commitment to ending no-grounds evictions on fixed term and rolling leases, the Treasurer would not be drawn on rental policy. Three days after the Assembly the Liberal Party announced it would introduce reasonable grounds evictions on rolling leases.

The Society has been a part of the Sydney Alliance since its Founding Assembly in 2011. In this 2023 State Election Assembly, Vinnies has worked closely with other organisations to bring its policies on social housing, rental security and homelessness services to the negotiating table.

Our thanks to all the Society's members, volunteers and staff from across the metropolitan Central Councils who attended this important Assembly. The Vinnies 'sea of blue' was unmistakable!

Community Connections – Does this interest your Conference?

Is your Conference looking for ways to engage with your community, promote the Vinnies brand and let people know what your Conference is about?

We have various options available to Conferences, all with support from your Member and Community Engagement team. Consider the following:

Vinnies Market Stalls

If you have a local market that is regularly held, then a Vinnies stall may be just the thing needed to let your local community know about the various works of Vinnies.

Contact MetroMembers@vinnies.org.au and we can liaise with the Market Organisers to arrange a date for the Vinnies stall to be held. We can provide flyers, merchandise, tables, tablecloths and a Vinnies marquee. We will assist with setup and pack down on the day. All you need to do is ensure a few Members (at least 2 at all times) are available for the duration of the markets to talk to the community about the good works that our wonderful Members and Services provide.

Shopping Centre tables

One way for the community to get involved with Vinnies as well as learn about the works that Vinnies do, is through shopping centre tables. If your local Shopping Centre looks like a great location to host a Vinnies table for a day, please let your Member and Community Engagement Coordinator know. We will contact the Shopping Centre to request permission to setup a Vinnies table. On the day, we will provide tables, chairs, Vinnies tablecloth, merchandise and a list of groceries that the Community can donate to provide support to your local Vinnies Support Centres (VSC). As shoppers enter the Shopping Centre, they may like to take a slip of paper that contains a list of desired groceries for donation.

Shoppers can buy as little or as much as they like, and then leave their donated grocery item in a shopping trolley next to the Vinnies table. At the same time, they may like to have a look at some of the Vinnies flyers, utilise some of the merchandise, and chat to a Vinnies Member. The Member and Community Engagement team will provide all materials to Members and liaise with the Shopping centre. All you need to provide is a few Members (at least 2 at all times) to be available for the duration of the day, and to drop off the donations to the closest VSC. Our team can be available on the day to assist if you prefer.

Vinnies Awareness Campaign at Parishes

Are you considering a recruitment/information weekend at your local parish? These can be held at any time of the year, but there are significant social justice days in the national and international calendar that can provide that extra opportunity to highlight the good works of the Society. Approaching social justice events include National Volunteer Week (Monday 15 – Sunday 21 May).

If you would like to consider having a recruitment/information campaign at your local Parish at any time during the year, you can receive support and planning help from your Member and Community Engagement team. Notices can be provided for inclusion in Parish bulletins in the lead up to the Vinnies weekend, and on the weekend itself, suggested speaking notes can be provided to a Vinnies Member to speak at the Masses, a Vinnies table can be setup with flyers, information packs and membership application forms.

Parishioners will have an opportunity to meet with Conference Members before and after Masses to ask questions and explore Vinnies as an opportunity for them to get involved.

School Fetes

Vinnies Marquee, flyers and merchandise can be available for your local school fetes – a wonderful way to let the parents and staff of your schools know about Vinnies. Please contact your Member and Community Engagement Coordinator.
