

RENDU APARTMENTS OPENING

On 19 January 2021, NSW Minister for Families Hon. Gareth Ward joined Lake Macquarie MP Greg Piper, Bishop Bill Wright, Leo Tucker, John McKendry and Jack de Groot in the unveiling of the new Rendu Apartments in Cardiff.

These apartments are the largest complex to date in the SAHF project with 94 apartments in the complex. Guests were lucky for the rain to hold off for the event which saw a mixture of staff, members, VIPs, and tenants attend and have the honour of taking part in a traditional indigenous smoking ceremony. Followed by a blessing from Bishop Bill and Leo Tucker.

Prior to the opening, Toronto Conference members advocated tirelessly to secure tenancy and provide dignity comfort and hope to Chloe who attended the day. Chloe is the first successful applicant of the complex and was able to take her pick of the units to suit her small growing family.

She could not express her gratitude enough and agreed that this would be a life changing opportunity with the wrap around support and security of a long term home for her and her children.

Michelle Kot (Schools & Youth Engagement Officer- M/N) and Sarah Kemp (Manager Member & Community Engagement- North East) have attended Maitland/Newcastle regional council meetings recently to generate discussion around innovative recruitment of under 40 year olds and exciting flexible roles we can develop for this missing cohort. Across the North East we would love to profile the great works of Parish conferences and Mini-Vinnies/high school groups coming together. With Rosetta Leo working with schools in Lismore, we envision a space where conference members can share how they engage with schools and inspire each other to take that first step, to create these invaluable connections if they're not currently there for your conference.

We're dreaming of a network that is accessible for all and may begin online as an extension of this newsletter then hopefully once restrictions ease, meet face-to-face. Stay tuned for this.

McAuley Catholic College Grafton

An example of a conference working with their local school is the great collaboration between St Mary's Conference in Grafton, and McAuley Catholic College.

The association between St Mary's Conference Grafton and McAuley Catholic College commenced in 2015 when a student approached President Barry Whalley following the conference canvassing new members through the Parish Bulletin.

At the time there were no local charities or agencies open between Thursdays and Mondays. Barry saw an opportunity for students to become involved with conference, and for assistance to

be provided on Saturdays, by conducting interviews on Saturday mornings.

Barry visited McAuley Catholic College giving introductory and information sharing talks.

When a number of students indicated a willingness to join, Barry gave a 'Welcome Friends' session. Ongoing talks were given to senior students.

Some young members began assisting on Mondays and Thursdays during school holidays. Each young member is active in client interviews: from sitting in "the chair" to recording, taking telephone calls, and completing computer work. From a core group of 18 students, the cohort has grown to over 20 students per year.


Other school-based members currently include 12 staff, 2 students and 2 past students.

St Mary's Conference has only been able to continue their Saturday interviews because of the support of these young members.

Since the restrictions of COVID have impacted the interview process, the students continue to be as active as the older members.



Students witness and value the link between fundraising for Project Compassion, Caritas and the Winter Appeal (including a sleepout) and the need in their own backyard. Social Justice is



integral to the charism of the school and the Religious Education Curriculum.

The students' involvement with the Society is a real-life experience for the students which they can connect with and become engaged in Social Justice issues.



Yearly SVdP events at the school involve Christmas Hampers, Winter Appeal and Sleepout, weekly Community BBQ (postponed during the pandemic) and replaced with cook-ups for ready-made meals.



The students have held Buddies Days. The students are looking at other initiatives.



The students have hospitality at heart, banding together to prepare meals for the families of fellow students affected by the bushfires. In the lead up to Christmas, they held a big cook-up to distribute meals to struggling locals and help

make sure everyone has access to food over the holidays.


Our young generation is more aware of Social Justice issues of today's world than when I was their age (I am 57). With social media, they have no choice!



MAITLAND/NEWCASTLE CENTRAL COUNCIL

Sr Carmel Hanson is the Social Justice Representative for Maitland/Newcastle Central Council and SVdP currently focusing on the need for more Social Housing. The latest government figures show 46,000 general social housing applicants in NSW and a further 5,300 listed as priority up to the end of June 2020. The St Vincent de Paul Society NSW has called on the State Government to build an additional 5,000 new social housing properties each year for the next decade to address the current social housing waitlist. We will be canvassing all our local MPs to seek their support in this vital issue. 

1. Parish Bulletin insert

We are here to offer a 'hand up' to people in their time of need. Our members volunteer through local groups called Conferences and provide support with food, clothing, financial aid, companionship, connection, referral onto other services, raising funds and advocating for social justice issues. We welcome anyone who shares our spirit of community service, believes in compassion and justice, and wants to help people. Please ring [xxxxx] or email [xxxxxxxxx]."

2. Permanent Parish Bulletin insert

3. Pulpit Talk.

"Good morning/evening, I am XXXXX from St XXXX's Conference of the Society of St Vincent de Paul. here in XXXX.

I am sure that everyone at this Mass today has heard of the Society, often referred to in a shorthand way as 'Vinnies'. The Society's mission states: "The Society of St Vincent de Paul is a lay Catholic organization that aspires to live the Gospel message by serving Christ in the poor with love, respect, justice and joy, and by working to shape a more just and compassionate society". It is a challenging mission, but in attempting to achieve this mission we Vincentians have experience great satisfaction, and yes often joy.

Here in XXXX we have XXXX active conferences. A Conference is a group of members who meet at agreed times and undertake assigned tasks. We also [describe any other activities your Conference takes part in, such as running the local shop etc.].

Many of you have already generously supported the works of the Society by contributing to our fundraising appeals or donating quality goods that could be sold or passed on to people in need.



Thank you. Your generosity has enabled us to support individuals and families at very difficult times in their lives...to give them a hand up when it is needed most. But while the work of the Society is often highlighted at times of natural disaster such as drought, bushfire or flood, it is the on-going, everyday work of helping people who are experiencing unemployment, homelessness, domestic violence, economic hardship, illness, addiction or family breakdown that is a challenge for us in the Society.

In addition to these challenges, we have a growing number of people in our community, often those who are aged, or infirm, or who are lonely, and who really appreciate having a caring person visit and spend some time with them.

Like our Church's clergy, our members are ageing, and the Society needs new people - Vincentians with enthusiasm and new ideas to continue our good works. We Vincentians come from a variety of backgrounds and bring a range of talents to our roles. And in my experience, every Vincentian has brought their own special skills to make a difference in the lives of those we seek to help.

Perhaps you could do the same as a Conference Member, or a volunteer working in our shops...or even in a special role where you see a need in the community? We know that there are many demands on our time, especially those who are parents of young children, families where both parents have employment responsibilities, even grandparents whose children or grandchildren live away and who appreciate regular visits. The Society has become more flexible in requiring a level of commitment from its members and volunteers, and so is keen to find ways in which those wishing to join can be become involved and their personal contribution welcomed and appreciated.

So, if you think you have the time, (I am sure you all have special skills and talents to offer) please speak to myself or my fellow Vincentian XXXX, after Mass. You may also know of a friend or family members who may be interested in getting involved and if so, please let us know, or speak to them about the Society. We will be conducting a

short information session in the coming weeks or so, during which you can find out more about our work in XXXX and meet some of our current members and volunteers.


