She was a passionate advocate for her staff, and I know they will miss her leadership.


I have watched in appreciation and sincere respect as, with unflinching focus, she has remained committed to the people we assist and lived up to the highest Vincentian standards.

# **CLEAR PATHWAY TO VOICE REFERENDUM**

Following months of consultations with the Referendum Working Group, the Government has announced the wording of the referendum question and draft constitutional amendment for the proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament. The question the Parliament will now consider to be put to the Australian people will be:

> A Proposed Law: to alter the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice.

The Government hopes to have Parliamentary approval by the end of June, with the referendum to be held between October and December.

Earlier this year, representatives of the Society of St Vincent de Paul participated in the 'Yes 23' campaign launch in Adelaide. The

launch saw over 100 grassroots organisations come together to support the campaign for a First Nations Voice to Parliament.

The breadth and diversity of these organisations reflect a strong backing of the Call of the *Uluru Statement From the Heart* as well as the commitment to build community understanding, awareness and support for the referendum.

The Society of St Vincent de Paul in NSW and across the nation supports the call for a First Nations Voice enshrined in the

Constitution. This derives and is informed by our Good Works of charity and justice.

We support the Voice because we aspire to a society transformed by compassion and built on justice – where the dignity and hope of all people is respected by ensuring they have control of their own destiny. We know the importance of vulnerable people having a voice. As The Rule states,

> The Society helps the poor and disadvantaged speak for themselves. When they cannot, the Society must speak on behalf of those who are ignored. (1 #7.5)

A Voice to Parliament is about ensuring the First Nations people have a real say in the decisions that affect their lives permanently.



The Society's support for the Voice is a matter of social justice – not politics.

One in five people seeking our support in NSW identify as being Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander. In their hardship we witness the long-term impact of the dispossession and powerlessness endured since the earliest days of colonisation.

> Giving First Nations peoples a voice will help break this vicious cycle and lead to better laws and policies for the wellbeing of their families and communities.

The Society's Social Justice Team have developed a suite of resources to support our networks to better understand and take action in support of the *Uluru Statement from the Heart*, and the Voice to parliament.

# **Spiritual Reflection - A Voice Calls Out**

#### ISAIAH 40: 3-5

- **3** The voice of one calling out, "Clear the way for the Lord in the wilderness; Make straight in the desert a path for our God.
- 4 Let every valley be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; And let the uneven ground become a plain, And the rugged terrain a broad valley;
- 5 Then the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all flesh will see it together; For the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

When we think of the wilderness sometimes, we are reminded of rough terrain or barren deserts. We see the wilderness again in New Testament before Jesus is crucified, he is led by the Spirit into the wilderness. This time was one of immeasurable pain for Jesus.

So, when we hear about the wilderness in this passage from Isaiah, we also hear that a voice of one cries out right here. What is the pain in this wilderness? From this place of pain, where there is isolation and harsh conditions, a voice of one cries out!

We can view this as a single voice, like the voice we recall from Exodus with Moses and the burning bush, or the still small voice of God in a rushing wind. Or, we can see this as one united voice! A voice of unity from the places of pain and despair, within this wilderness comes a collective cry to make the paths straight.

We are asked in the *Uluru Statement from the Heart* to walk with our First Nations peoples in unity with them for truth seeking, treaty and A VOICE.

From our very own wilderness within our Nation's brutal history we are called to raise the valleys and smooth out the uneven

ground and take our part in a more just and compassionate society.

This passage of scripture finishes with what we can reflect on as a commissioning from God for this most important demand. Preparing these paths, walking in unity and being a voice of one will then reveal the glory of the Lord, that the Lord has spoken.


We must always look for opportunities where we can speak into the darkness of the wilderness of our days and do whatever good works are at our hands for sake of dignity, truth and restoration.

# **A Vincentian to remember**

Julien was born in 1926 in a town not far from Passchendale, a place burnt into the hearts of Australians in the Great War. He lived through the German occupation in WWII, qualified as an engineer, and was ordered to Germany on graduation by the Gestapo to work for the Third Reich.

Instead of helping the enemy of his country he went into hiding at great risk. He evaded the Gestapo until liberation then joined the Belgian Army.

He worked in Germany getting their essential services into operation and was a Harbour Master on the Rhine. Discharge came in 1947 and he decided to head to the wide sunny brown land under the Southern Cross.

His natural aptitude and intellect lead him from manual jobs to engineering

installation. In search of warmth, he moved from Melbourne to Queensland and eventually to New Guinea, where he met the love of his life Paula.

Back in Sydney he climbed the management ladder travelling on three continents. Eventually through declining health he decided to retire at 60. He built his own stone house in the Goulburn District, and he joined the St Vincent de Paul Society. Because the gaol was in his diocese, he was kept very busy also working with the southern area health service and the hospital.

Julien became the Diocesan President of the St Vincent de Paul Society and was revered in his diocese for his commitment to those in need.

He and Paula had two children and, in his later years, he and Paula moved to the War Vets at Narrabeen. He was an active member of the RSL. In the early part of this century he joined the St Rose Conference Collaroy Plateau and carried on doing client visits into his nineties.

Julien left this life on July 3rd,2022 - a life of loyalty, devotion, sacrifice, and service that was an inspiration to all that were

fortunate to walk through life with him from Zedelgem to Narrabeen.

# **Charles O'Neill Walk at Rookwood**


27th July 1926 - 3rd July 2022

On the morning of 17th January 2023, some members from Davidson and Forestville Conferences together with some friends of the Society gathered at the Sacred Heart Chapel, Rookwood Catholic Cemetery.



A short distance away is the Charles O'Neill walk. At the start of the walk there is a plaque containing an outline of Captain Charles Gordon O'Neill's legacy:

".... Charles O'Neill is remembered principally for his life's commitment to the welfare of the poor and inspiring and leading others to his commitment in Scotland, New Zealand and Australia. He was responsible for establishing the St Vincent de Paul Society in New South Wales with the support of the Society of Mary at the Catholic parish of St Patrick's Church Hill, Sydney in July 1881....



"Remembered also for promoting a more sympathetic, non-judgemental approach to Christian Charity .... Inspired by the examples of St Francis of Assisi and St Vincent de Paul ... and championed a kind of charity that reflected the mercy and teaching of Jesus Christ."

Next seen is the headstone over the grave that commemorates Charles O'Neill who died in 1900. In 1961, his remains were reinterred in the Society's burial plot for the destitute at Rookwood, to commemorate the Society's 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the foundation in Australia.

# **Coolah - Home of the Black Stump**

For over 15 years, the generous St Martin de Porres School Community, in the leafy Northern Beaches suburb of Davidson, have supported families needing a "hand up" in the regional town of Coolah.

"Why Coolah and where is Coolah?", you may be asking.

Around 2006/2007, New South Wales was in severe drought and people in the country were finding life tough.

Some city St Vincent de Paul Conferences were twinned with country Conferences to provide them with the support they may have needed. Davidson Conference was twinned with Coolah Conference and so began a wonderful friendship with the support of our local St Martin's Primary School.



The lovely small town of Coolah (known as the town of the black

stump) is situated in the central west part of NSW, about 400 km from Sydney. Surrounded by paddocks of grain, cattle and sheep, the township has suffered times of drought, floods and fires in the short time we have been visiting.

Each year at Christmas time, the St Martin's School Community with the wonderful support of their Principal, teachers, parents and children donate huge baskets of food and toys to the families of Coolah and surrounding areas who could do with a "hand up".



With the help of a dad from our Frenchs Forest Parish (and his trusty trailer) and a couple of Vinnies members the generous gifts are transported 400 kms there and 400 kms back in one day!!!

The Vinnies members in Coolah serve us a lovely lunch and make us feel so welcome. We enjoy such great country hospitality and look forward to our annual trip. The journey there and back helps us appreciate the hardships endured by our country friends of droughts, floods and fires.

Some years the grass is so dry it crackles and some years it is quite green – but each year nature serves up something different!

We are so grateful to the St Martin's community for their generosity and thank them for their amazing support over all the years.

St Vincent de Paul Society NSW members and leadership were among over 45 diverse community organisations, unions and religious organisations united in an Assembly calling for social justice in the lead up to the 2023 State Election. The over 900strong Assembly was held in Westmead on Tuesday 28 February.

Matt Kean (NSW Treasurer), Daniel Mookhey (Shadow Treasurer) and Jenny Leong (NSW Greens spokesperson on Housing) headlined the political attendees, while speakers with lived experience shared moving personal testimonies highlighting why our politicians need to act.

With the current cost of living and housing crisis leaving a growing number of people in precarity, including many needing to seek assistance from organisations such as the Society for the first time, the Assembly called on the State's political leaders to commit to eight asks on social and affordable housing, climate and cost of living, and belonging and democracy.

On the night, both major parties said they understood the need to boost the supply of social and affordable housing so that key workers, people on low incomes, and the growing number of people experiencing homelessness have a place to call home. Regrettably though, neither committed any figures on funding or social housing places that would back this shared concern.

Both parties agreed any new social and affordable homes delivered through development partnerships will remain so in perpetuity.

They also agreed to meet with the Sydney Alliance within the first 100 days after forming government to discuss issues facing temporary migrants. Both parties also agreed to consultation on minimum energy efficiency standards in rentals.

While Labor stated its commitment to ending no-grounds evictions on fixed term and rolling leases, the Treasurer would not be drawn on rental policy. Three days after the Assembly the Liberal Party announced it would introduce reasonable grounds evictions on rolling leases.

The Society has been a part of the Sydney Alliance since its Founding Assembly in 2011. In this 2023 State Election Assembly, Vinnies has worked closely with other organisations to bring its policies on social housing, rental security and homelessness services to the negotiating table.

Our thanks to all the Society's members, volunteers and staff from across the metropolitan Central Councils who attended this important Assembly. The Vinnies 'sea of blue' was unmistakable!

# New Census homelessness figures: A national crisis

Action on homelessness and housing must be made an immediate priority for all levels of government following the alarming figures on homelessness released as part of the Australian Bureau of Statistic's <u>latest census</u>.



"It is not an overstatement to say that this is a national crisis and drastic action has to happen right now to ensure everyone has a safe and secure place to live," said Yolanda Saiz, St Vincent de Paul Society NSW then Acting CEO.

"Homelessness across Australia has risen by 5.2% from 116,427 to 122,494 people during the course of the last census.

"It was pleasing to see the number of people experiencing homelessness in NSW has decreased from 37,692 to 35,011 since 2016 - a decrease of 7%.

"However, the number of people experiencing homelessness is still 27% higher from when the 2011 census was conducted a decade ago.

"It is unacceptable that the number of people experiencing homelessness remains so high, especially given the efforts made during the height of the pandemic, when the census was taken,

"We need to keep working on reducing homelessness in NSW and around Australia," Ms Saiz said.

The ABS statistics reveal that there has been a 63% decrease in rough sleepers throughout NSW from 2,588 in 2016 to 963 in 2021, while the homeless rate was 43 persons for every 10,000 persons in the 2021 Census, down from 50.4 in 2016 Census.

"Our members are seeing the reality of the housing and homelessness crisis every day in the communities where they live and work," said Paul Burton, St Vincent de Paul Society NSW State President.

"Around a quarter of the people we've assisted this year have sought help for the first time, including a growing rate of families and people working full-time, because there is simply not enough money to make ends meet.



"We cannot allow things to continue as they have been with housing; we need to see major reforms and investment to give the most vulnerable in our communities safety now and hope for the future.


to ensure our most vulnerable were housed.

"The Government set precedent, providing people sleeping rough with emergency accommodation during the worst of the COVID lockdowns.

"We know it is possible, when there is political will, to provide greater assistance **to people** experiencing homelessness.

"We've seen at a state level that targeted programs such as Together Home for rough sleepers and the Social and Affordable Housing Fund (SAHF) have helped contribute to a 7% decrease in the number of people experiencing homelessness in NSW.

"The Society commissioned research from UNSW last year which showed that if the NSW Government built 5,000 new social housing dwellings every year for a decade, the NSW social housing waiting list would be reduced by three quarters.

"We've also called for an increase in funding for Specialist Homelessness Services which will be vitally important as a necessary measure to ensure services are properly funded to meet the growing demand for assistance.

"We cannot wait any longer to address the homelessness and housing crisis – action is needed now," Mr Burton said. S

# WINTER APPEAL 2023

As the temperature begins to drop and we start to feel a chill in the air, for many who are homeless or struggling with higher energy bills, this winter will be particularly bleak. This year's Vinnies Winter Appeal focuses on a fast-growing cohort of people experiencing homelessness in Australia: women over 55.

We know homelessness can affect anyone, but women over 55 are particularly vulnerable. The 2021 census showed the number of older women experiencing homelessness continued to grow after ballooning by more than 30% between 2011 and 2016. In 2023, this is a more concerning issue due to additional stress brought on by the cost of living and housing affordability crises causing more older women to find themselves homeless or at risk of homelessness.

The Society thanks our dedicated Members for the important role they play in raising funds for the Winter Appeal so we can continue give a hand up to those in our community who need it the most. The Winter Appeal will launch on 1 May 2023.

# Leading For Impact - Society's new program

'Leading for Impact', the Society's New Leadership Program from the University of Notre Dame is open for Registrations

We are pleased to announce the rollout of a new leadership program that has been co-created with the University of Notre Dame.

This program is specifically designed for aspiring and current Regional and Central Council Presidents, as well as any interested member of the Society thinking about future leadership positions.

It provides a unique opportunity to develop the knowledge and skills necessary to lead with purpose and impact from a Vincentian perspective. The course draws on the University's vast experience in leadership development for Catholic organisations.

Participants will gain formation and a deeper understanding of leadership theory, while also learning practical strategies and best practices for leading and managing service-orientated organisations.

The program will be delivered in person at the University of Notre Dame in Sydney and is broken down into seven face-to-face modules of 6-7 hours each that explore:

Formation, which focuses on Catholic Social Teaching and encourages participants to make connections between the experiences of poverty, disadvantage and marginalisation that they encounter in their everyday work and the unjust structures that contribute to inequality and exclusion. **Leadership and management,** which explores contemporary business leadership and management practice in the context of Catholic leadership.

**Governance**, which explores principles of governance and regulation particularly as it applies to not-for-profit organisations.

**Financial reporting,** which helps participants develop applicable finance, accounting and business skills.

**Counselling skills for leaders**, which provides participants with skills to enhance relationships and improve our capacity to serve the poor and marginalised with compassion, respect and empathy.

**Supporting member and volunteer engagement**, which addresses factors that help sustain volunteer engagement.

**Digital communication and security,** which provides the knowledge and skills to effectively communicate and collaborate in a digital environment while also keeping sensitive information secure.

#### We are currently looking for the first cohort of participants.

These will be delivered at Notre Dame, Broadway on Friday 28th and Saturday 29th April for the initial sessions, with a follow-up session to be held on the 16<sup>th</sup> June.

Participants can be current leaders, those who aspire to be in a leadership position, or those who demonstrate leadership skills but may not yet recognise themselves as a leader. Young Vincentians are encouraged to apply.

#### Community Connections – does this interest your Conference?

#### Vinnies Market Stalls
