

Commemorating Blessed Frederic Ozanam

Dear All,

Today the St Vincent de Paul Society commemorates the passing and feast day of our co-founder, Antoine Frederic Ozanam, 172 years ago in Marseille. There is much to reflect upon within the life and legacy of Frederic Ozanam. Frederic's vision was for the revival of a Church of integrity, a Church inspired by Gospels rather than by corruption and politics. He called for a Church to hear the cry of the poor.



Born in Milan 23 April 1813 and baptised Antione Frederic Ozanam, he was one of 14 children but only one of 4 surviving to adulthood. Frederic moved to Lyon in 1815 where he live much of his childhood and schooling years, before moving to Paris to join the University of Paris in 1831.

He was a literary scholar, lawyer, journalist, author, university lecturer, and social justice advocate. Frederic and friends revived a university debating group known as the Conference of History, which discussed the impact of the Church through history. In many ways, it was a debating group on the virtues of the catholic faith. Through these reflections and discussions on faith he and his companions were moved and challenged to expressing this raw faith into actions of charity and of love. In this on the 23rd April 1833, Frederic's 20th birthday, the group then became the Conference of Charity, later known as the Society of St Vincent de Paul.

Frederic Ozanam later married Amelie Soulacroix 1841, the daughter of the rector of the University of Lyon, which was followed by the birth of his daughter Marie in 1845. Sadly, his naturally weak constitution fell prey to consumption, which he hoped to cure by visiting Italy, but on his return to France he died in Marseille on Thursday, September 8, 1853, at only the age of 40. He was buried in the crypt of the church of St. Joseph des Carmes at the Institut Catholique in Paris.

Frederic's legacy...

- Frederic was a man of faith. He understood the importance of his work within the guidance and nurturing of prayer and spiritual advice. One such advisor was Sr Rosalie Rendu, a Daughter of Charity working in the slums of Paris who nurtured Frederic's spiritual centre or spiritual love, as she expressed, a love that was practical and relational. She reminded Frederic often that charity was to "be kind and love, for love is your first gift to the poor."
- Frederic was a man of love. His love for God and Church was strengthened because of his relationships with those experiencing deep poverty, his confreres and his family.
- Frederic was a man of hope. He saw the importance of a legacy of justice and advocacy for the disadvantaged in society. He related by being a voice for them. Frederic was a champion for social justice especially towards the end of his life. His desire to raise controversial issues in the magazine 'The New Era' was not at all welcomed by many conservatives within the Church. However it was because of his relationships with the people he loved, the blindness of Government and Church and the continued oppression of the weak and vulnerable which moved him deeply to speak out. This response for justice and love permeates in all aspects of the writings of Frederic as he wrote; "Knowledge of the poor and needy is not gained by pouring over books or in discussions with politicians, but by visiting the slums where they live, sitting by the bedside of the dying, feeling the cold they feel and learning from their lips the causes of their woes."

Understanding the charisms of Frederic Ozanam is crucial in deepening our personal spirit. It will give us a profounder insight into the words of our mission and vision, as well as a deeper appreciation for our Society logo of the hands receiving, assisting and blessing.

May Frederic Ozanam continue to guide our Society in hearing and understanding the cry of poverty and faithfully serve in compassionate love.



St Vincent de Paul – Feast Day 27 September

The spirit of St Vincent de Paul is alive and well in 2025.

Growing up in a Catholic family in the 1960s, the St Vincent de Paul Society (Vinnies) was very much part of our world. My father was a Vinnies volunteer and my mother spent many years working at the Rendu Centre. We later moved to a Vincentian parish where we encountered the distinctive charism through the work of the priests, brothers and various ministries of the Daughters of Charity.

The St Vincent de Paul Society is a lay Catholic organisation founded in Paris by Frédéric Ozanam in 1833. Profoundly moved by the abject poverty of families living on the streets after the French Revolution, he gathered a small group of people to begin the work of ministering to the poor, modelling their mission on the patron saint of Christian charity, St Vincent de Paul (1581-1660).

"Deal with the most urgent needs. Organise charity so that it is more efficient...teach reading and writing, educate with the aim of giving each the means of self-support. Intervene with authorities to obtain reforms in structure... there is no charity without justice." (St Vincent de Paul).

Vinnies has grown today into a global organisation with over 800,000 Members and 1,500,000 volunteers, assisting 30 million people each day. The Society works towards creating a more just and compassionate world by providing food, clothing, housing and access to support networks for people in the community who are marginalised or disadvantaged. Vinnies offers a "hand up" rather than a "hand out" and advocacy on behalf of those in need goes to the heart of what the St Vincent de Paul Society stands for.

While historical perspectives and contemporary data help to provide context for the work of the Society, the interactions between Members and volunteers with clients is where the Gospel message and the spirit of St Vincent de Paul himself are enlivened. Vinnies is about engaging with the personal stories of others, wherever and in whatever circumstances prevail. The slow and gentle work of God in the world today is never clearer than in the relational aspect of walking with another and getting to know their story.

CHRISTMAS APPEAL 2025



Everyone deserves access to the essentials needed to live with dignity. Even in difficult times, people should feel secure knowing they can afford a home, put food on the table, pay their bills, and maintain their health. This is especially true at Christmas, when people should be able to enjoy the Festive season without stressing over unpaid bills, high rents, and the costs of providing a Christmas gift or meal for loved ones.

Australia's persistent cost of living pressures are far from over. The cycle of poverty and disadvantage still continues for some, with effects that are long term and intergenerational. At St Vincent de Paul Society NSW, we are seeing short term safety nets being regularly relied upon for ongoing relief. Many of the people we support are being trapped in a cycle of disadvantage and poverty from ongoing high costs of living, the housing crisis and food insecurity.

The 2025 Vinnies Christmas Appeal will focus on this cycle, so that we may stop its progression and provide assistance that makes a lasting impact and improvement in people's lives.

For a second year in a row, our Members have helped over 100,000 people across the state with immediate intervention, safe housing, alongside food, clothing and medical aid. We continue to help people throughout their journey of rebuilding with counselling, education, vocational and life skills training.

The Society is grateful to our dedicated Members for the important role they play in raising funds for the Christmas Appeal. Funds raised will directly support our core programs, providing vital assistance to people experiencing or at risk of homelessness, poverty, and cost of living pressures.

The Christmas Appeal launched on 1 November 2025. Materials to support your Christmas Appeal efforts, such as posters, donation envelopes and Conference booklets have been available since 13 October 2025.

Here is a letter from Colin, a senior citizen and parishioner in the Northern Beaches region, to students who had prepared Vinnies hampers, including a note to those receiving the hamper.

Hello Josie*,

I am writing to thank you for the wonderful hamper that you and Rita* made. Thanks also to your parents and the school for encouraging you to make it. We are all very pleased with you – but so are God the Father, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. They know you understand Jesus' command to "Love your neighbour". Your parents are also an important part of your neighbour.

There are a few things in the hamper that my dentist will freak out over – but I will eat them anyway. I loved your card – it is much more pretty than I could have made. Thank you again. You making the hamper tells me that you are a kind person. That is very important in life. God, your parents and your teachers are all very happy and pleased with you for that. So am I.

God is extremely clever. Long before He made the world He had already worked out how to help people get to Heaven. The Eucharist/Holy Communion bread or host, in the Mass is changed by God the Holy Spirit into Jesus. It still looks like bread, but is now Jesus himself. When a person receives the Eucharist they are taking Jesus into their body. In this life you cannot become closer to God and to Heaven than that. Jesus told us to love God and to love our neighbour. By preparing the hamper you have done both of those commands. Jesus, the Father and the Spirit will all be pleased with that. They all love you very much and are looking forward to receiving you in Heaven after a life of loving Him and your neighbours and receiving Jesus in communion every day if possible.


Celebrating our Volunteers & Members across Broken Bay



On Sunday 30 March, many Members and Associates, both past and present, attended a celebration Mass and morning tea at Pymble Sacred Heart Church for the 76th Anniversary of the Aggregation of the Pymble St Vincent de Paul Society and 76 years of serving our community. We presented to the community a short talk on the founding and history of the St Vincent de Paul Society in 1833 in France and our current works.

Blessed Frédéric Ozanam and his university friends identified that people were experiencing tremendous political and social upheaval, changes in government, industrial unrest, economic uncertainty and unjust employment practices. They responded in practical ways to the poverty and hardship they saw in the lives of people around them. Today we continue to meet the same challenge.

Our Pymble Conference currently consists of over 20 members from all walks of life and age groups from early 20's to nearly 90 years of age, whilst the two Catholic primary schools have "mini Vinnies" to introduce children to community needs and strongly support our Winter Appeals and Christmas Hamper appeals.

Our Members and Associates' actions in the community include client visitations, visiting the homeless at Matthew Talbot Hostel in Sydney, manning food vans and breakfast vans in various Sydney locations, visiting the disadvantaged at Glebe, Vinnies representation on the Ku-ring-gai Affordable Housing Committee, establishing programs for lonely residents in two aged care facilities with music appreciation, bingo, coffee mornings, trivia, men's group, rosary group, and taking the Eucharist to residents at the aged care facilities. Pymble Conference supports 15 twins in the poorest communities in Asia.

We are thankful for the very active and generous support of our Parish Priest, Fr Ireneusz Czech, our parish and schools Sacred Heart and Our Lady of Perpetual Succour at Pymble and West Pymble.

To quote Mother Teresa of Kolkata... "Be kind and merciful. Let no one ever come to you without coming away better and happier – be the living example of God's kindness".

Vincentians among recipients at Broken Bay Awards Celebration

Three long-time Members of the Society of St Vincent de Paul were among 11 award recipients at the Broken Bay inaugural Awards Celebration, held on 30 May to recognise decades of dedicated service to the Catholic Church and the Diocese.

Bishop Anthony Randazzo invested John Donnelly OAM, Barry Finch OAM and Alan Henson OAM as Knights of the Order of St Gregory the Great. This is in recognition of their personal service to the Holy See and Catholic Church, as well as for the wonderful examples of service they have set in their communities. In addressing the gathering, Bishop Anthony Randazzo said the evening was "more than a ceremony".

"The individuals here tonight are being recognised for living their Christian lives as luminous beacons of hope and service. They have allowed their faith to guide their actions and their actions to reveal their faith.

"It is fitting that we do this under the guidance of Mary, Star of the Sea – a title that has resonated so strongly with seafarers, missionaries, and the faithful across the ages.

"For us in the Diocese of Broken Bay, bordered by the sea and shaped by waterways, Mary under this title is more than a poetic image, she is a real and guiding presence.

"Mary is not only Star of the Sea, but in our Southern skies, we also look to the Southern Cross, that distinctive constellation that has guided generations navigating the vast oceans of this hemisphere."

He said the award recipients can also be seen as stars, reflecting some of the divine light guiding everyone forward. "Whether through their service as priests, consecrated religious, or lay people; through ministry to the blind and disabled, as RCIA coordinators, Saint Vincent de Paul volunteers, catechists, altar servers; or assistants to three bishops; our recipients have given exemplary and selfless service in unnumerable ways to our local Church of Broken Bay.

"And just like the stars that shine brightly in the night sky, they inspire us, and we give thanks to God for them."

Being a Navy Veteran, Bruce is regularly in attendance at the annual ANZAC pre-dawn ceremony at Balgowlah RSL. Bruce was in the Royal Australian Navy in its Medical Division from 1965 and retired a Lieutenant Commander in 1986.

Young Leaders of Hope















Over two days in late July, the Australian Catholic University (ACU) Strathfield campus became a vibrant gathering place of faith, compassion and leadership as students and teachers from across the Sydney, Parramatta and Broken Bay dioceses came together to grow in the mission of the St Vincent de Paul Society.

Wednesday 24 July, more than 220 primary school students from 28 schools attended the annual Mini Vinnies Gathering. The day invited students to reflect on how they can be leaders of hope, living out the Gospel call to love and serve others—especially those experiencing hardship. Through engaging workshops and reflections, students explored real-world issues including the cost of living, housing and homelessness, while learning about the work of Vinnies Support Centres, the Vinnies Van, and caring for God's creation through stewardship. Students were encouraged to respond with compassion and action through their Mini Vinnies groups. They discovered that even small acts of kindness, rooted in love and justice, can reflect the light of Christ in the world.

Thursday 25 July, the inaugural Vinnies Secondary Schools Gathering brought together 90 high school students and teachers to deepen their understanding of Catholic Social Teaching and how faith can inspire leadership and advocacy for the poor and marginalised. The day included inspiring talks, group activities, and moments of reflection that challenged students to think critically about social justice. They explored how to put faith into action and walk alongside those in need—just as Jesus did. The passion, energy, and spiritual maturity of the students was uplifting. Many shared their commitment to continuing the mission of Vinnies in their schools and parishes, acting as witnesses to God's love through service.

These two days were a powerful reminder that young people are not just the future of the Church—they are the present. Through their generosity, faith, and courage, they are already making Christ's presence known in the world. "It's truly inspiring to witness so many young people embrace the call to be leaders of hope," said Metro Vinnies Schools Engagement Team (Chris Nolan, Ketaki Wasnikar, Roydon Ng). "Their energy, compassion, and commitment to social justice reflect the very heart of our mission—to walk alongside those in need with love, dignity and faith. We look forward to continuing this journey with schools across the dioceses."

Looking ahead, the St Vincent de Paul Society is excited to continue nurturing these young leaders of faith. Planning is already underway for next year's gatherings—to be even more enriching, prayerful, and impactful for students answering the call to love and serve.

Twinning Update



Supporting the good works of our Vincentian Twins in Surabaya

I visited Surabaya, the second largest city in Indonesia and located in East Java, from 22 to 29 July this year. I was visiting in a private, self-funded capacity. I was visiting friends in Surabaya but also took this opportunity as the Twinning Officer of my local Chatswood Conference to visit SSV (Vinnies) Conferences in Surabaya to learn about the work they do. One of our twin conferences that I visited, St Yohanes Pemandi, is in Surabaya.

I was hosted during my visits by Selviana Kurniawati, the Twinning Coordinator for all of Indonesia who is based in Surabaya, and for much of the time also by Rike who is the Assist A Student Coordinator for all of Indonesia. I attended the weekly meeting of the Indonesian SSV National Council. They meet every week on a Wednesday evening to coordinate the activities of the almost 400 local SSV conferences in Indonesia. This is all done on a voluntary basis. I was able to discuss with them, especially Wirawan the Projects Coordinator for Indonesia, the need for all the information on the application forms for grants from Australia, which is to satisfy the accountability and outcome measures that are standard Australian practice. I think they found this information helpful.



I was taken to visit four local Conferences and I learnt quickly that the poverty levels in Indonesia are of a different dimension to that in Australia. There appeared to be no help for the poor from the government, so the role of SSV in Indonesia is vital.

The first one was Benoit Labre Conference. They had 32 clients in attendance for their twice monthly provision of food. They provide rice to their clients who are very poor as well as help with school expenses, clothes and medicines. Some of their clients are becak (rickshaw) drivers and people who are widowed and cannot support themselves or their families.

I was taken to St. Vincentius Conference which is a Catholic secondary school conference with 20 active student members and two teachers involved. They arrange visits to Muslim schools and Muslim student visit their school to aid inter-faith dialogue as Indonesia is a predominantly Muslim Country.

They visit the homes of elderly Catholic sisters and visit a neighbouring orphanage which I visited. It was sad to see so many young toddlers in this orphanage. They fundraise by selling prepared meals and cakes and are also involved in plastic re-cycling to raise money. They give rice, oil, sugar and second-hand clothes to becak drivers and other poor people. I visited the home of one of their clients who was a man in his early 50s who could not work because of severe ill-health and there were nine people (of three generations) living in his small house.

I next visited our twin conference, St Yohanes Pemandi, and met the president Pak Pik who is a 77-year-old man who has been the President of the conference for 20 years. It appeared most of the assistance provided was in the form of financial support to parents for their children to attend school. The parents I met were very grateful for the support that they receive. I went to the home of one of the families and the mother of three school-aged sons talked about how important the financial assistance was.

I visited the St Louise de Marillac Conference where they sell food twice per month on a Sunday to raise funds. They assist students with expenses for schooling and provide food and other basic needs for their poor clients. They have a special mission to 27 local becak drivers and their families who are very poor. Apart from providing food aid they act as a "bank" for the becak drivers where they keep their money until the end of Ramadan each year when the becak drivers collect it for their family. This is important as many of the becak drivers come to Surabaya from villages in the country and sleep in their becaks so this provides some security for the money they earn.



I attended the Surabaya Regional Council meeting which meets every three months. All 15 local conferences provide an activity report on who they are supporting and their finances. They must report each quarter to remain a twin conference and obtain financial aid. A Vincentian priest is the spiritual advisor to the group and attended the meeting and led a time of meditation.

I was asked to give a talk at all the conferences and meetings I attended. I was able to do so with my basic Bahasa Indonesia language skills which they appreciated as English is not widely spoken there except among educated people. They were all very interested in the work we in Vinnies do here and how we raise funds ourselves and are very grateful for the financial support we give to them. Overall, I was so impressed with the commitment and dedication of our fellow Vincentians in Indonesia. They are doing important work amongst the poor and marginalised in that country. Their work is vital as the needs there are so great and should continue to be supported by us here in Australia.

Raising Our Voice – Speaking up for Social Justice

Around 100 members, volunteers, staff and friends of the Society joined the Rosalie Rendu Forum during Anti-Poverty Week on 16 October to discuss the importance of advocacy in making positive change for vulnerable members of our community. Moderating the event, Geraldine Doogue reflected on the current state of the world – with so much war and political turmoil obscuring the deepening injustices closer to home including poverty, homelessness and domestic violence. She drew on the expertise of four justice advocates who have engaged in different types of advocacy for and with the people they assist.

Speaking of supporting people with lived experience of homelessness, Charmaine Jones of StreetCare spoke of the commitment of people who are homeless wanting to prevent others going through the same experience. With support, she says, "They offer a perspective that differs from many decision makers within Government and it leads to better outcomes, more accountability and better service delivery."

Vinnies Member Jo Karaolis spoke of organising the Ku-Ring-Gai housing group, advocating for social and affordable housing in a part of Sydney resisting development. Jo says, "The housing crisis has been with us for a very long time... If we'd been providing leadership during this time we could have led housing reform. Good government comes down to good communities that care for each other locally and on the broader stage." Delia Donovan of Domestic Violence NSW spoke of political engagement to get much needed funding for services that are stretched beyond breaking point. Political engagement is about relationship building and bringing lived experience into the dialogue;

"We need to know when to go hard and when not to go hard, because we need to be able to stay in the room and remain pragmatic, but also to be bold and brave. It's a really fine balancing act".

Dharag Elder and educator, Aunty Thelmerie Rudd spoke of how having a voice is fundamental to the dignity of all. We need a place where all voices are heard. In the face of ignorance and instances of racism, Aunty Thelmerie asks; "How can we create a space where we can all sit together, we can all talk, we can all yarn? ... we need to look at issues and look for what we can advocate on for community and for kids in school."Geraldine asked the panelists about key learnings and advice when engaging in different kinds of advocacy. Some of the wisdom shared included the following:

- Good advocacy with decision-makers is about building long-term relationships of equal partnership and is not primarily adversarial.
- Learn from and form respectful connections with the people who disagree with you.
- Engage with all sides of politics not just the party in power.
- Approach peak organisations who can lend advocacy support and follow up on decision-maker transparency and accountability.
- Come to advocacy with suggested solutions, not just the problem.
- Good solutions often ensure a "win win" for all sides.
- Story telling is vital people from the front line and people with lived experience are often the strongest advocates.
