Sandra and Terry Drum Celebrate 10 Years with Corowa Vinnies

Sandra and Terry Drum recently celebrated 10 years as members of the Corowa Conference of Vinnies. In their early years with the conference Sandra and Terry took responsibility for processing the monthly accounts on "Accounts Friday" before they were mailed to Sydney for payment. This was in addition to their regular interviewing of clients on what are usually busy Fridays.

Most importantly, Sandra and Terry have long been heavily involved in the organisation and logistics of our Christmas Hamper Project. Typically, the Corowa Conference is responsible for packing about 90 hampers each year. For Sandra and Terry the work starts 6 months in advance of Christmas when they accumulate polystyrene boxes (for packing food hampers), and toys for the young children of our clients. Sandra takes a particular interest in matching the toys to the age, sex and needs of each of the young children. As the time for packing the hampers approaches, then Sandra and Terry get busy setting up the hall to receive food donations by food group.

Sandra and Terry are also heavily committed to their family who are widely scattered, and take more than a passing interest in the operations of the family farm. Which just reinforces the saying if you want something done, ask a busy person!

She actively sought out the opportunity to help at the Vinnies shop, volunteered at the Vinnies Canteen at Football Wagga, supporting fundraising efforts for the Community Sleepout, and was a friendly, welcoming presence at the Youth Social Gathering. She is so excited to participate in the next Buddies Day and help create a fun and inclusive experience for all children involved.

Mayram embodies the core values of a Youth Member with her compassion, commitment, and community support. Her joy and energy shines bright, and her natural ability to connect with others has made her an instant fit within the Youth Conference. Leading by example, offering her time, talents, and heart to those who need it most.

St. Sebastian's are incredibly grateful to have Mayram as part of their Youth Conference and we all look forward to the continued impact she will bring within the Society.

Mission, Spirituality & Pastoral Care

In September in Rome, Pope Leo XIV will canonise two very young saints – Blessed Carlo Acutis and Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati.

Carlo Acutis was a British-born Italian, who was only 15 when he died from leukaemia. He was considered, even by adult computer engineers, a genius in anything to do with computers. Carlo was devoted to the Eucharist from the age of 7, never missing an opportunity for daily Mass. He very successfully used the internet to draw young people to the Eucharist.

Pier Giorgio Frassati is very special to us in the Society.

Frassati was born in 1901 in Turin, Italy. Despite neither of his parents being religious, he grew up with a deep faith and a strong prayer life. From a young age, Pier Giorgio demonstrated faith in action, often giving away his possessions and significant amounts of money. At the age of 17, he joined the St Vincent de Paul Society.

Pier Giorgio embraced life. He was considered handsome and was adventurous and athletic. He was an avid hiker and mountain climber, as well as a lover of arts and music. He would organise outings in the mountains with his friends, which often served as opportunities for prayer and discussions about their faith on the way up or down from the summit. He was also known for his sense of humour and practical jokes.

In his beatification homily in 1990, Pope John Paul II said:

"At a superficial glance, Frassati's lifestyle, that of a modern young man who was full of life, does not present anything out of the ordinary. This, however, is the originality of his virtue, which invites us to reflect upon it and impels us to imitate it. In him faith and daily events are harmoniously fused, so that adherence to the Gospel is translated into loving care for the poor and the needy."

Pier Giorgio embarked on studies to become an engineer. Unfortunately, before completing his university degree, he contracted polio (which he is believed to have caught from the sick people he was visiting). He passed away on 4th July 1925 at the age of 24. For his funeral, the streets of the city were lined with hundreds of mourners who were unknown to his family – the poor of Turin whom he had served for the past seven years.

Pier Giorgio Frassati is one of the Patrons of World Youth Day and also the worldwide Patron of Vincentian Youth. Our youth conference in the Lismore Central Council bears his name.

I love that these two young people highlight the magnificence that our youth can be. As the mother of two young adults, observing them and their friends in this world, as well as the big hearted and capable young Vincentians we have both working for the organisation, and as members who volunteer their time, I believe our future is in very good hands...

Good Works, Good News Story

Albury Regional President, Louise McManus, recently gave this address to parishioners:

"The St. Vincent de Paul Winter Appeal has begun and I would like to update you on our work in Albury. We give material support, advice and advocacy to local people in need.

In the last financial year our members provided \$95,000 of assistance on nearly 2,000 occasions. Over half of our clients were homeless or living in temporary accommodation. More than half spent over 30% of their income on rent; more than three quarters depended on unemployment or disability benefits. At the moment our fastest growing cost is emergency accommodation—we can afford to help only the most vulnerable people.

To illustrate how many are caught in poverty traps I will outline an unusual situation we dealt with recently.

A middle-aged tradesman I will call 'Rick' called us after he lost his income due to a back injury. He had to wait six months for surgery but his application for a disability pension was rejected by Centrelink; his appeal also failed. He sold everything he could spare to pay his rent, and asked us for help with his expenses. We provided food and petrol, and paid his medical bills and electricity account. But we also advised him to seek a review of the Centrelink decision from a higher agency. It was overturned a week later and Rick received his pension back paid to his first application. He was going without food as he was worried about the cost of his travel to the hospital in Wollongong. We advised him to seek an allowance from Services NSW to cover the cost. His landlady was intending to increase his rent by \$10 a week and threatened to evict him a week after his operation if he couldn't pay it. We encouraged him to contact a tenancy advocates and he was allowed to stay on.

I'm pleased to say his operation was a success and he is applying for work. He came to our office to thank us for our support – with your prayers and donations we hope to continue this important work."

Leeton St Joseph's Conference

In April 2025, St Joseph's Conference Leeton submitted a grant application to the Leeton Shire Council requesting \$1,000 to purchase warm blankets for those in need. Due to rising energy costs, we believed that providing quality blankets would be an effective and practical way to help vulnerable members of our community stay warm throughout the colder months.

With the generous support and guidance of Ana Suarez from the Wagga Wagga office, our application was successful. As a result, we were able to acquire 35 blankets, which we have been steadily distributing to our clients in need during this winter season.

This initiative has allowed us to offer comfort and warmth to many individuals and families who would otherwise struggle to cope with the cold.

A new Vinnies Van for Wagga Wagga imminent

Vinnies Vans Services has served those experiencing homelessness for over 60 years throughout NSW. With 13 Vinnies Vans operating across the state, our outreach services support people facing challenges such as job loss, family breakdown, mental health issues, financial difficulty, and domestic violence. Vinnies Vans Services promote social inclusion by providing a safe, non-judgmental gathering place.

In an exciting development for the region, a new Vinnies Van Service will soon be established in Wagga Wagga with hopes that the new van will be delivered in Spring this year.

The Payce Foundation have funded the purchase and fit-out of a vehicle and significant financial support from the Hilton Hotel and local donors has been received for the ongoing van operational costs. This follows several years of fundraising efforts by our members and staff.

The Wagga Vinnies Van will have its operational base at the Edel Quinn Specialist Homelessness Service, with outreach services provided by volunteers and supported by a paid part-time coordinator. Van stops and runs will be determined in consultation with members and local community groups.

In May, Solange Frost, Regional Director and Carol Parkinson, Regional Administrator had the privilege of presenting to the Wollundry Rotary in Wagga about the Society's proposal to establish a Vinnies Van in the local area, and to outline growing needs in the community and the support provided by the Society NSW's members. We thank the Wollundry Rotary for their interest and look forward to working with them more closely to grow the Vinnies Van Service.

Coming Soon: New Visitation Guidelines

New Vincentian Visitation Guidelines, approved recently by the NSW SVDP State Council, will be introduced in the coming months.

Conference Visitation guidelines were last updated in 2021 and have been under review over the last 2 years, with three consultations conducted in May 2024, involving 35 members from 10 Central Councils sharing feedback, current good practices and challenges encountered while providing assistance.

The objective of the update is to provide a comprehensive Conference Visitation Guideline that offers a consistent framework and a repository of tools to standardise visitation practices across Conferences in NSW. The key objectives of the project are to:

- Consolidate the Vincentian Visitation Guideline and Toolkit, WeCare framework, and other relevant resources, into a single document.
- · Establish a framework and repository of tools to implement benchmark visitation practices across NSW.
- Provide one point of reference that supports members, volunteers, and staff to provide quality services and referrals.

Reconciliation Week

During National Reconciliation Week (May 27 – June 3), local Conferences in Wagga Wagga, Albury, and Narrandera came together over afternoon tea to reflect on this year's theme: "Bridging Now to Next" looking at our shared histories, cultures, and achievements and exploring how we can each contribute to achieving reconciliation in our communities and across the nation.


These gatherings created space for thoughtful conversations about the 2025 theme and its relevance to our daily work. Staff and community members explored how we can all become agents of change: bridging historical truths and current realities with a vision for a reconciled and inclusive tomorrow as well as how truth-telling, respect, and connection can shape a better future for First Nations peoples.

As part of the afternoon tea, participants engaged in a storytelling session featuring the children's book 'Our Country: Where History Happened' which highlights the deep cultural heritage and resilience of First Nations communities.

This was followed by a language-sharing experience, where attendees learned several Wiradjuri words that can be meaningfully woven into our communication and practice to show respect and help keep culture and identity alive in our day-to-day interactions.

National Reconciliation Week reminds us that reconciliation is not a one-week event but an ongoing journey. Let us continue to walk together, "Bridging Now to Next", with a commitment to unity, respect, and genuine partnership.

This year's theme, "The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy," honoured past achievements and a bright future led by young voices.
